

Accredited Courses for Professionals

Earlier this year, several of our most experienced educators took an extra course to equip them to deliver our two OCN accredited courses—'Drugs, Young People and the Role of the Youth Worker' and 'Drug Prevention for Family Workers'.

Taught over two days (or four half days) these courses are designed to equip youth, family and community workers to manage drug issues and incidents within their role.

The courses include learning what drugs looks like and do, how to recognise drug use, helpful interventions (for both education and when there are issues) and much more. Learners can, if they wish, then do extra work to gain credit from the Open College Network. Both courses are mapped against nationally recognised standards and good practice.

Previous course participants have found the training extremely helpful, saying 'the whole course was helpful – I gained more knowledge, heard examples of real life stories, learnt games to play with young people, factual information; questions & answers were very helpful; packets of drugs to identify; everything was an eye-opener'.

In 2020 we hope to increase the number of courses we can deliver (hence training more educators!), as the need for support for young people regarding drug use is sadly vital at this time.



Drugs in the News

You are probably aware that there have been some challenging, and sad, statistics in the news this year regarding drug use and drug deaths.

- ⇒ Scotland had 1,187 deaths attributed to drugs in 2018, the highest in Europe
- ⇒ Approximately 50 young people are excluded from school every day because of drugs and alcohol
- ⇒ 'County Lines' drug dealers can use young people to help move the drugs from place to place

These, and other headlines, have caused the debate about decriminalisation to increase—although the Home Office currently has no plans to change the drug laws.

There is always a need for our work—helping equip young people to have the information and skills they need to make sensible choices about the drugs they come into contact with. We do this by working with locally-based, highly-trained educators, delivering workshops and courses to young people, based on best practice, as well as offering training for parents and those who work with young people.

Can you help us this Christmas?

When it comes to county lines (county lines refer to gangs and organised crime networks that groom and exploit children to sell drugs), children are the most vulnerable. The Children's Commissioner estimates that there are 46,000 children in England who are involved in gang activity. 4,000 young people in London alone are being exploited through county lines. **County lines are a big threat to our society, they destroy young lives, destabilise families and make communities unsafe.**

Rita's story

Rita, 15 (not real name), has been asked by friends who are in gangs to sell drugs on their behalf.

"I grew up in an area where there is a lot of drugs, gangs and knife crime. A friend of a friend who is a gang member saw me and asked if I could take his bag across the road to someone. I said, 'No, I can't I'm on my way somewhere' and walked away. I was so confident when I said NO!

Before being involved with Hope UK, I knew about drugs and county lines because of where I grew up. Being part of Hope UK has made me understand more about drugs and gangs, I am more vigilant.

I have my life ahead of me. I can't drop everything for drugs. I can't risk it all by selling drugs and end up in prison."

This Christmas we aim to raise £5,000 to help more young people like Rita to make healthy choices and to build their peer resistance so they can navigate their way in challenging situations.

- **Host a mince pie day or evening** – Have friends and family come together for a mince pie afternoon, raising money for Hope UK.

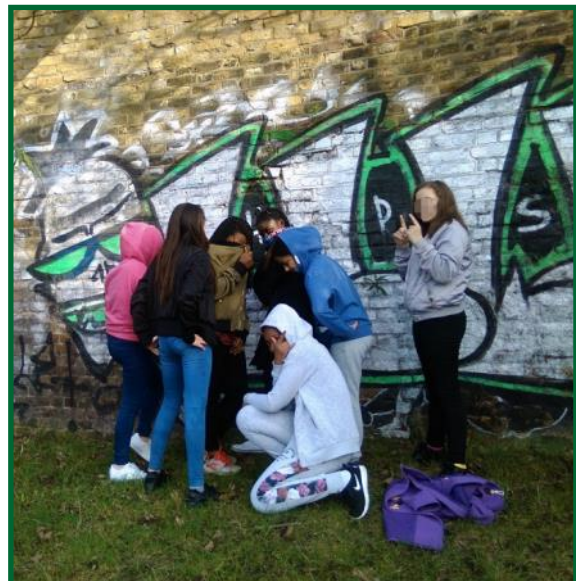

Sadly, this Christmas, some mothers may have a very different shock, when they find out that their children are using drugs.



This is Mercy's story;

"Years ago, I fell victim to an ignorant, holier than thou attitude of myself, congratulating myself unknowingly that our children were good and would never do anything wrong.

"A friend of the family made us aware that one of my sons was taking cannabis. That was the beginning of a long and torturous journey ever since.

"Looking back, I wish I knew about organisations like Hope UK who offer excellent drug education and other works that could arm our children from potential experimentation with drugs.

"Things like confidence building, the right to say no without feeling guilty, the right to resist pressure from friends to take drugs etc."
